

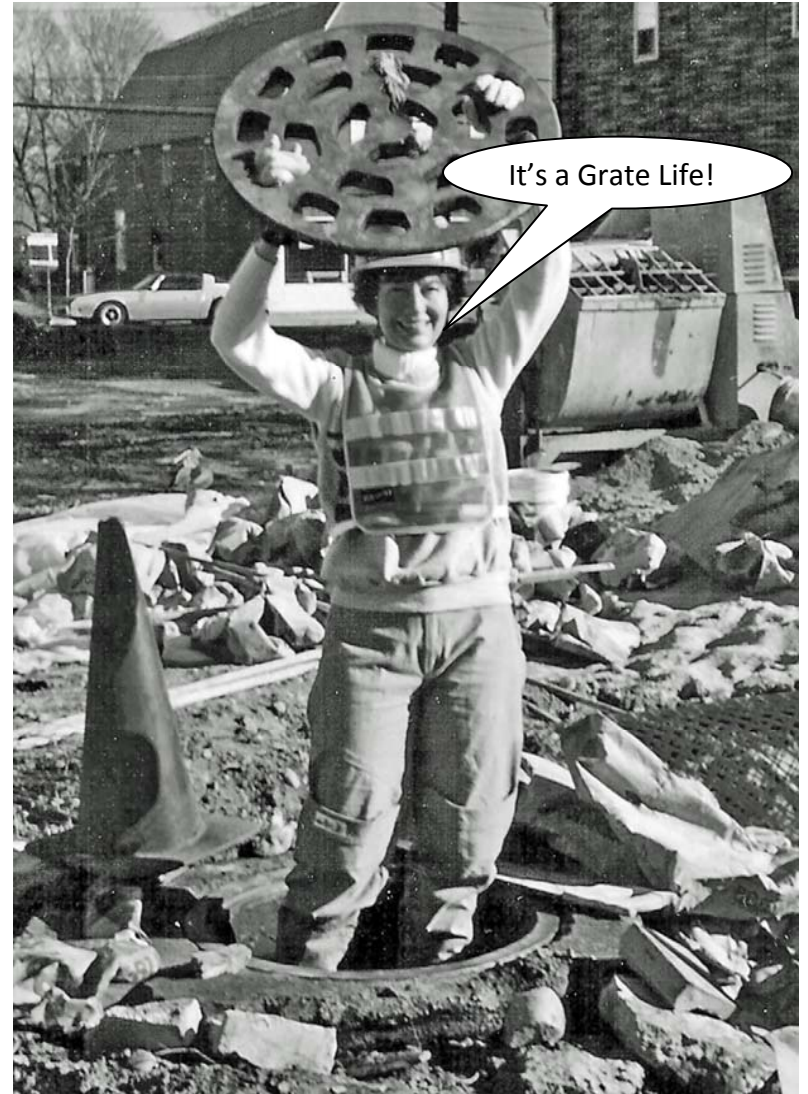
New York Hall of Science Features 'Grate Work' by Local Artist

Bobbi Mastrangelo's Grate Works are on exhibit at the New York Hall of Science in Queens through September 4, 1994. The artist depicts grates, manhole covers, water covers and sewer covers in simulated urban environments.
